


How SB20/50 Applies to Solid Waste Facilities (SWF)

Covered Electronic Waste Flow



Legislation

The intent of SB20/50 was to provide for safe, cost-free, and convenient collection and recycling of covered electronic waste (CEW).

Public Drop Off

Providing a place for the public to drop off monitors and TVs will require source documentation to be gathered on collection logs unless you are a local government or designated by one.

Note: Contact name and phone numbers are always required when 5 or more units are collected from a non-resident.

Proof of Designation Form

Local governments can designate approved collectors, that are not managed by a local government, to collect material on their behalf. The CIWMB requires "Proof of Designation" to accompany the collection logs.

Documentation Requirements CIWMB 198

CEWs entering the payment system as public collection must document California source names and addresses on a CIWMB 198 form.

Source Anonymous

CEWs whose California source cannot be identified can enter the payments system as source anonymous. Two basic routes for this material are described below.

Illegal Disposal

Source-anonymous CEWs that result from illegal disposal clean-up activities conducted by an approved collector who is a local government or designee; or from illegal disposal on a solid waste facility (SWF), or illegal disposal on property owned or managed by an approved collector.

Load Check

Source-anonymous CEWs that result from load check activities conducted at permitted SWFs. If the SWF is not an approved collector, CEWs must be transferred directly from the permitted SWF to an approved collector.

Documentation Requirements CIWMB 198 SA

CEWs entering the payment system as source anonymous must be documented on a CIWMB 198SA form.

*Recyclers can be dual entities, meaning they may fill the role of collector and recycler.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What are “covered electronic wastes”?

Referred to as CEWs, these devices include televisions and computer monitors that contain a cathode ray tube (CRT), laptop computers, and liquid crystal display (LCD) computer monitors. Also included are Plasma and LCD televisions and portable DVD players. All must have a screen size greater than four inches.

Are CEWs a hazardous waste?

Yes, but they are managed according to the Universal Waste regulations. Collection activities must comply with all laws and regulations.

How can CEWs generated at a solid waste facility be eligible for the payment system?

These CEWs can enter the system as Source Anonymous via load check activities or illegal disposal when discovered as unauthorized dumping at the collection site.

Why become an approved Collector?

Becoming an approved collector entitles you to receive .20 per pound from an approved recycler when supplying proper source documentation.
